Community Living Toronto is fortunate to have a membership base full of community leaders who not only believe in the mission of the organization, but play an active role in supporting it in a variety of ways. One of our newest members is Dr. Ashleigh Molloy. Dr. Molloy represents Canada at the American Association of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, and has been invited to represent Canada on the International Scientific Committee in charge of selecting speakers for the First World Forum on Disabilities Prevention. Last year, Dr. Molloy was presented with the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in recognition of his tireless efforts on behalf of persons with disabilities. Recently, Dr. Molloy was presented the Urban Hero Award from the Scarborough Mirror, which recognizes community members whose personal efforts, sacrifices or contributions have made significant impact to a cause, a person or a group in their local community. When Ashleigh Molloy's daughter was born with Down Syndrome, he began an effort to raise awareness of the dignity of every human being and to

build a community where everyone is welcome.

"Her birth certainly was a game changer," he said. "The compass turned me towards the area of disability studies and the special education needs community." Molloy's daughter, Lindsey, is now 24 and works as an assistant in a special education class and volunteers in a kindergarten class.

Molloy, who earned a PhD in disability, diversity and special needs education after Lindsey was born, is the president of the Ontario chapter of the American Association on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities and the immediate past president of the Down syndrome Association of Toronto.

He has also been involved in humanitarian outreach projects in countries such as Ghana, where he was awarded honorary citizenship.

Grant Win Pays for New Accessible Dock



On April 30th, four young men from Royal St. George's College - Matthew, Kai, Liam and Sean - won a \$5,000 grant for Community Living Toronto as

part of the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative. This initiative provides secondary school students a hands-on, reality-based experience through an academic philanthropy course. While preparing presentations, groups of students assess the needs of their communities, and compete for grants for community based charities. This group chose Community Living Toronto for their presentation, as Matthew wanted to give back to the Association that provides supports for his cousin.

While doing research for their presentation, the boys

learned how important Shadow Lake Centre is to the guests that visit it every summer. They spent a day at the camp before making their final decision regarding what the money would be used for. The boys completed their day with a pontoon boat ride before ultimately deciding that the grant would go towards building an accessible dock to allow camp guests in wheelchairs to fully take advantage of the lake, including boat rides and fishing! The dock was completed in time for guests to enjoy it before summer ended. In Memory of Bruce Allan Walling

Everyone in the Etobicoke/ York Supported Independent Living (SIL) program was saddened by the sudden passing of Bruce Walling on November, 16. He had an unforgettable personality and made an impact on everyone he met.

Bruce was born and raised in Toronto and lived with his family until he was in his early twenties. He first became affiliated with Community Living Toronto in 1980 when he and his mom, Doreen Thomsen, received support from the Home Management Program. He lived for a short time at 1400 Sheppard.

Never shy to express himself, Bruce was quite adamant that he preferred a more independent and self directed lifestyle and joined the SIL program in the mid-eighties.

After living at a few different apartments, Bruce settled in at a triplex

in Downsview where he met Robert Scott. While they got along famously they couldn't have been more different. Bruce was small and outgoing while Robert was large and reserved; the proverbial "odd couple"!

Bruce moved to Lakeshore Village with Robert in Etobicoke in 1993. When Robert passed away, Bruce found another great roommate in Mark McComb, whom he lived with for the last seven years.

Bruce was an avid sports fan with a particular fondness for college sports. "He was a walking encyclopedia of sports," recalled Melissa Birt, his Support Worker. At his apartment, it was not unusual for Bruce to have one hockey game on the radio and another on the TV while he read the sports page! He volunteered at St. Michaels College School helping the hockey team get ready for practices, games and keeping the change room in order. Later, he brought his zest and energy to the University of Toronto Varsity Blues hockey team as their loyal mascot.

Bruce had a great sense of humour and loved talking to people. Ten years ago, Bruce struck up a friendship with Michael Ward, while attending a Tigers baseball game in Detroit with Joanne O'Connor, a former CLToronto staff. Michael was so taken by Bruce's charm and wit that he invited him back to Detroit to attend a Tigers baseball game with a few of Bruce's friends. Continued on page 10.

The staff in North York are currently busy planning the annual Holiday Hampers. As we have been meeting to discuss how we can reach out to as

many of our families who need a little support during the coming holiday season, we have also been reflecting on the impact this initiative has had on so many people over the years. We are now planning our 16th Holiday Hampers campaign.

In previous years, we have supported up to 42 households receiving services in our region. We also work collaboratively with other regions to ensure our limited resources go as far as possible towards making the holidays a little more cheerful for as many people as we can. Hampers go to families in service who have been identified by staff who they feel can benefit most from a few extras over the holiday season.

During a recent planning meeting, staff started to tell each other stories about how this initiative has impacted them, the families they support and others who have been involved. One staff member recalled the giving tree; staff loaded a tree with paper leaves with wishes written on them that donors

could take off to fulfill. One wish came from a young girl who really wanted a digital camera. She was thrilled to receive the one item she really wanted most. This gift made the young girl very interested in photography and she has since acquired another digital camera. She is now looking for high schools that offer a photography program.

While the reminiscing continued, one of our Early Childhood Services staff members recalled a pre-schooler class that had a pancake fundraiser. They initially planned to use the funds for books for their class but as the holidays were coming, they decided instead that they wanted to help a family in need. They heard about Holiday Hampers and decided to adopt one of our families. They picked out toys from a catalogue and helped to put the hamper together. The staff involved with this said she was truly touched by children so young wanting to give to others.

We each also shared stories about going into the stores to purchase food and gift cards. The reaction from store clerks and customers who hear what these purchases are for is nothing short of inspiring! And to think we get to be part of this! Although the tasks are many and the time involved can be overwhelming, there is not one member of our North York Hamper team who would give up their involvement. We truly do get more back from this than what we ever put into it.
