# Community Living Sarnia Presents Summer Employment Transitions

Community Living Toronto staff gathered at the Victoria Park Hub on May 11<sup>th</sup> for a presentation on creating a summer employment program for students who have an intellectual disability. The workshop was organized by Community First and sponsored by Youth 2 Work from all four regions.

Bob Vansickle, manager of the Community Living Sarnia Employment Options program and current Training Coordinator for the Ontario Disability Employment Network delivered a humorous and fact-filled day of training. Topics included the importance of an "employment first" philosophy for people who have a disability, how to access inclusive employers, the value of minimum wage employment for jobseekers with disabilities, and accessing traditional volunteer opportunities to increase work skills.

Vansickle also presented a summer jobs toolkit which outlined how to create a summer employment program for students who have a disability. According to a 2011 Canadian Association for Community Living report, only 26.1% of working age Canadians with an intellectual disability are employed and close to 40% have never worked. Vansickle stated that these low statistics can be turned around, with one method being to help high school and college students who have a disability find paid employment. The presentation mentioned that according to a 2013 study (Improving Post-High School Outcomes for Transition-Age Students with Disabilities). "The number one indicator of successful labour market attachment for people with a disability, upon graduation from school, was having a paid job while in school". Vansickle reinforced that providing these opportunities was a key factor in fostering relationships with families and the business community.

The workshop was part of an ongoing effort by the Community First Project to increase the awareness of innovative and creative approaches to support people receiving services from Community Living Toronto. The Community First Project is one of the 38 projects funded in Ontario by the Ministry of Community and Social Services to modernize service delivery and make them more individualized and responsive.
